

Topical Fluoride for Children (TFL-CH)

Learn how to improve your HEDIS¹ rates. This tip sheet gives key details about the TFL-CH measure, best practices, codes and other resources.

The percentage of children ages 1 - 20 years who received at least two topical fluoride applications

Measure

• Dental OR oral health services²

- Dental services
- Oral health services

within the reporting year as:

Children aged 1 - 20 years as of December 31 of the measurement year. Report eight age stratifications and a total rate:

Eligible members

Ages 1 to 2	Ages 10 to 11	
Ages 3 to 5	Ages 12 to 14	
Ages 6 to 7	Ages 15 to 18	
Ages 8 to 9	Ages 19 to 20	
Total ages 1 through 20		

Allowable gap

- No more than one gap in continuous enrollment of up to 31 days during the measurement year.
- To determine continuous enrollment of a beneficiary for whom enrollment is verified monthly, the child may not have more than a single one-month gap in coverage.

American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP)/Bright Futures recommends:

- Fluoride varnish application at least once every six months for all children and every three months for children at high risk for dental caries.
- Performing oral health risk assessments on all children at every routine well-visit beginning at 6 months of age.

Best practices

• Recommend use of fluoridated toothpaste starting at eruption of the first tooth: rice-grain sized amount for children younger than 3 years, and a pea-sized amount for most children starting at 3 years of age.

Best practices

United States Preventative Services Task Force (USPSTF) recommends:

- Primary Care Physicians (PCPs) prescribe oral fluoride supplementation starting at 6 months for children whose water supply is deficient in fluoride. To find out what public water is fluoridated by region, refer to:

- PCPs apply fluoride varnish to the primary teeth of all infants and children starting at the age of primary tooth eruption.

Other Recommendations:

- Remind parents that bottled water is generally not fluoridated.

- Check with parents if member has received a topical fluoride treatment within the last six months prior to current visit.

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 Administrative enrollment and claims data is required within the reporting year for measurement.

Medical Record Documentation

- Documentation is required of at least two instances on different dates of service.
- If the parent reports their child already received topical fluoride at a dental visit, this can be documented in the patient's medical history.

Helpful coding tips

Who can bill for varnish application? How many times per year will I be reimbursed for applying varnish?

Application of topical fluoride varnish by a physician or other qualified healthcare
professional is reimbursable with CPT code 99188 for children 0 to 5 years of age, up to three
times a year.

Who can apply topical fluoride in California?

• Fluoride varnish must be applied by a physician or other qualified health care professional, a clinic staff member who works under the supervision of a qualified health care professional, or other allied health providers who have completed one of the recommended online fluoride varnish trainings.
